The Township too supports its business community by offering a business directory on our website where residents can search for an accountant, a daycare, an auto repair shop and more. SafetyNet Tracking Systems



Caring for someone with a cognitive condition who wanders is a considerable responsibility. SafetyNet Tracking Systems helps public safety agencies quickly find and bring home loved ones who may be lost.

Falls Township Police can provide your loved one

with a SafetyNet bracelet that they should always wear. Water-proof bracelets feature a radio frequency transmitter that emits a continuous signal. If a loved one is missing, caregivers would contact authorities immediately. Trained search and rescue teams track the signal emitted from the bracelet, locate the missing person and return him or her home safely.

Radio frequency technology can work in densely wooded areas, buildings and shallow water, even when GPS and cellular technology can not.

Capital Improvements On Deck

Falls Township will maintain its current municipal tax rate in 2025, while continuing the same high-quality services residents have come to appreciate.

The 2025 spending plan, which the Falls Supervisors adopted in December, will hold the line on the current 8.97 millage rate.

Even with holding the line on taxes the Township is planning a number of capital projects for 2025, including culvert improvements at South Olds Boulevard, Rice Drive and Falls Township Community Park. In addition, repairs are planned for Martins Creek, as well as drainage upgrades at Briaroot Lane. Mill and overlay projects planned for next year include Cedar Lane, Corbin Lane and East Tyburn Road.

In addition, Falls has earmarked \$100,000 to replace the 15-year-old slide at Pinewood Pool and \$70,000 for improvements at Elderberry Park and Mill Creek Manor Park.

Under the budget, property owners would continue to pay \$269.10 for an average assessment of \$30,000 under the Township's 2025 budget. The owner of a similarly assessed Bristol

Township property, by comparison, paid \$1,059.40 in local taxes for 2024, while the owner of a similarly assessed Northampton Township home paid \$1,415.

Unlike neighboring communities, Falls residents are not assessed for trash and leaf pickup.

The 2025 spending plan reduces the reliance on host community fees from \$16.8 million in 2019 to \$7 million for 2025, according to Finance Director Betsy Reukauf.

Reukauf said \$10 million is estimated to be collected in 2025 from the EIT.

For decades, Falls officials have worked hard to do more with less. For every \$1 paid in taxes, Falls Township receives just 4 cents. Yet, year after year the Township sees spiraling pension contribution increases. Over the last decade, the Township has seen its pension obligation nearly triple. Pension contributions surged from \$1.3 million in 2012 to \$2.6 million in 2017, with nearly \$3 million projected for next year, all while the state contributions have remained relatively flat.

In all, \$48,871,695 is projected to be spent in 2025.

Touch a Truck Fundraiser Breaks Record

The 2024 Touch a Truck fundraiser proved to be the most successful charitable fundraiser to date, generating \$30,000 in sponsorships. Donations were split evenly between nonprofit organizations The Goofy Gators and The Barkann Family Healing Hearts Foundation.

Stumps, Bayard Pump and US Municipal.

Future Touch a Truck and other fundraising initiatives will be managed under Falls Township's impending 501c3 nonprofit organization. The organization is tentatively called Friends of Falls Township Park, but officials said another name will likely be chosen.

Yard Waste Cleanup

The 2025 yard waste cleanup will take place on Saturday, April 19. Please have it out in the same location as your regular trash pickup by 6 a.m. Yard waste must be bagged in 30-gallon biodegradable paper bags or placed in 30-gallon trash containers with-

out lids. Branches must be no larger than 4' in length, bundled, and not to exceed 50 pounds.

Supervisors Eye Industrial Zone

New industrial operations are on the horizon in Falls Township.

During a recent Falls Supervisors meeting, the board granted preliminary and final land development approval for construction of a cold storage facility, as well as areas for the storage and production of mulch and compost.

With the approval Agile Cold Storage will construct a 232,596-square-foot warehouse on a 14.5-acre parcel situated on the south side of Cabot Boulevard East. Once built, the warehouse would operate in two shifts with 70 employees working during the busiest work shift, according to attorney Mike Meginniss, who represents the property owner.

The facility, he said, would be used for the sole purpose of storing cheese and French fries.

"That's two of my five food groups," Chairman Jeff Dence joked.

In addition to the new warehouse, a new rail spur, driveways, parking, entrance roads, a guardhouse and stormwater facilities would be added to the parcel. Supervisor John Palmer, the lone no vote on the project, raised concerns about the waiver related to sidewalk construction, stressing that walking along Cabot Boulevard for employees who take mass transit would be unsafe.

The board also granted preliminary and final land development approval to Britton Industries to clean up the junkyard at 4 M-Y Lane and transform it from "an eyesore" to a "positive use for a good business in Falls," according to Meginniss, who also represented the applicant.

The company intends to create eight lease areas ranging in size from 1.76 acres to 1.99 acres on the 17.34-acre property for outside storage and production of mulch or compost. Existing buildings will be demolished, and no new buildings will be constructed, according to the plan.



Township Building Nearly Finished

Falls Township's long-awaited municipal complex construction project will be completed and open to the public this spring.

Grace Construction Project Manager James Gates said he expects work to conclude this spring with punch list items being completed and furniture being installed thereafter. Once complete, the existing 60,000-square-foot space will be essentially rebuilt from the ground up with several new building additions, according to Gates.

Among the highlights is a community meeting room that residents and local organizations can use. The renovated building will offer a welcoming feeling, be open, light and inviting and feature a better layout and use of space. In addition, it will be more easily accessible with proper signage and identification to help guide visitors to their desired location.

The remodeled and expanded space will be something that residents can be proud of with building designs intended to subtly reflect Falls Township's history.

Initially the project had been expected to be completed by December 2024. However, major items that have caused the bulk of the delays were related to the exterior of the building. Once the walls were opened up, hollow cinder block was discovered all the way down to the footings, which required redesigning, re-engineering and a rebuild. Hollow steel construction on the east end required reconstruction as well.

The Department of Environmental Protection got involved once oil contamination was found, which, according to Gates resulted in a "long, drawn out process, lots of testing and retesting and searching for the source of contamination and removing it."

Since oil contamination was found "in the heart of the building," it dramatically slowed down the pace of construction.

Most of the site that roads were built on top of consisted of clay, debris, and trash throughout. To remedy the situation, Gates said an engineer oversaw construction of the roadways, as well as the excavation of bad material and ensuring that there is



a stable base.

Now that the issues have been resolved, the building is on track for spring completion.

The new and improved municipal building is being reconstructed with brand-new mechanical systems, electrical, HVAC, and plumbing. High-efficiency equipment and LED light fixtures are being installed throughout, which will result in energy savings. EV charging stations are also planned, although Gates said they may not be installed in tandem with the building's completion this spring.

The municipal project entails a complete updating of the existing building and integrating functions. Upgrades will include improvements to administration, code enforcement and the fire marshal, finance, parks and recreation, police, clerks, tax collector, and public works.

WM Opens \$120M Facility in Falls

Falls Township is now the home of one of the nation's largest green energy projects.

WM, operators of the Fairless Landfill Complex, is in the process of commissioning the site's landfill gas-to-energy plant located on New Ford Mill Road. It is expected each day to produce enough renewable natural gas to power the equivalent of 65,000 homes annually.

The company has invested \$120 million in the construction of the plant that will take landfill gas generated in the Fairless Landfill and the closed GROWS-North Landfill and convert the gas into pipeline-quality gas.

Landfill gas is created when organic material in our waste, including food waste, naturally decomposes. A system of wells connected to a vacuum system is used to collect the gas and move it to the renewable natural gas plant where it is processed and injected into the regional natural gas distribution system.

WM's investment in and operation of the facility is offsetting the use of fossil fuel and is another way the company is working for a more sustainable tomorrow.



Build Your Own Kent Bat Box

Simple to Construct, self cleaning and low maintenance.

The only critical measurement is the width of the crevices. These should be no larger than suggested. Other measurements are approximate.

Materials and construction


Box to be made from untreated rough-sawn timbers Timber should be 20mm thick The box should be rainproof and draught free Crevices can be between 15 and 25mm wide Fixing may be by use of brackets, durable bands or wires

Location

Boxes are best fixed as high as possible in a sheltered wind-free position, exposed to the sun for part of the day.

They can be fitted to walls, other flat surfaces or trees

Best Practices For Recycling

Municipal and state regulations require that residents, commercial establishments, and non-residential establishments recycle all recyclable materials. Commonly recycled materials include:

• Paper – newspaper, office/copy paper, glossy aper, color paper, cardboard.

paper, color paper, cardboard, junk mail, phone books, cereal/ cracker boxes

• Plastic – bottles and jugs No. 1-7

• Glass – clear, green and brown containers

• Metal – aluminum, steel, tin, and bimetal cans and containers

Please check with your hauler for a complete list of acceptable recyclable materials.



Avoid contamination of recycling materials with food or liquids

Materials contaminated with food or liquid cannot be recycled. Here is what you should do:

• Check that the material is recyclable. Look for the recycle symbol on items.

• Rinse jars, bottles, and cans that have visible residue in them. A quick rinse is usually adequate.

• Throw away heavily soiled items.

Acceptable waste is recycled

This question often comes up. People are concerned that not all the materials they put in their recycle bin are recycled. Their concern is that some end up in landfills. This leads some to minimize their recycling efforts. According to several major waste management firms in Montgomery County, all the acceptable recycled materials listed above are being recycled.

You should continue to recycle all the items listed in the first bulleted list above.

Things you should not put in your recycle bin

• Foam containers and cups, even if they have a recycle symbol on them

• Cups coated with wax or plastic such as soda cups

• Plastic bags such as grocery store bags (You can often take these bags back to the grocery store.)

• Flexible packaging such as chip bags or juice pouches

- Plastic wrap
- Container caps
- Diapers

Fire Marshal

Properly use and store flammable, combustible liquids

Use gasoline only as motor fuel, never as a cleaner or to break down grease.
Only store liquids in a container sold for

that purpose and never bring it indoors.Never store gasoline containers in a

basement or in the occupied space of a building. Keep them in a detached garage or an outdoor shed.

• Keep the container tightly capped when not in use.

• Never use flammable and combustible liquids near an open flame.

• Never smoke when working with these liquids.

• If you spill liquids on your clothing, remove your clothing and place it outside to dry. Once dry, launder clothing.

Carefully dispose of rags with paint and stain

The oils commonly used in oil-based paints and stains release heat as they dry. If the heat is not released in the air as the rags dry, the heat is trapped, builds up and can cause a fire.

• When you're finished using the rags, take them outside to dry, keeping them well away from the home and other structures.

• Spread rags on the ground and weigh them down so they don't blow away.

• Put dried rags in a metal container, making sure the container is tightly covered. Fill the container with a water and detergent solution to break down the oils.

• Keep containers of oily rags in a cool place out of direct sunlight and away from other heat sources.

Grillfing Safety

There's nothing like outdoor grilling. It's one of the most popular ways to cook food. But, a grill placed too close to anything that can burn is a fire hazard. They can be very hot, causing burn injuries. Follow these simple tips and you will be on the way to safe grilling.

SAFETY TIPS

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Weep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Weep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
-))) Never leave your grill unattended.
- >>> Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

CHARCOAL GRILLS

- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Weep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.



Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light scap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the scapy bubble test, and there is no fiame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.

If the fiame goes out, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least 5 minutes before re-lighting it.

FACTS July is the peak month for grill fires. Roughly half of the injuries involving grills are thermal burns.

Fire Marshal

Ensure your home is safe and free of fire hazards



• Ensure your address number is visible from the road. Remove debris that could obstruct the view of first responders.

• Clean out filters above your stove.

• Test your smoke and carbon monoxide (CO) alarms, replacing batteries if they are dead. Replace smoke alarms that are more than 10 years old, or CO alarms more than 5 to 7 years old.

• Have an emergency preparedness kit in case of power outages or floods.

• Dust or vacuum the coils behind the refrigerator. Unplug the fridge while cleaning the coils.

• Practice your home escape plan so everyone knows what to do in case of fire. Windows should be checked to ensure they open and close properly in case they are needed as an exit. Clear out stairs and landings so they are accessible during an evacuation.

• Check outdoor electrical outlets and other electrical appliances for animal nests and to ensure proper wiring.

• Recycle old newspapers, magazines, and junk mail. Piled up items can greatly contribute to the severity and spread of fire.

• Clean up and properly store paints, pool, and yard chemicals.

Tips for battery usage and disposal

Lithium-ion batteries supply power to many kinds of devices, including smart phones, laptops, e-bikes, smoke alarms and more. These batteries store a large amount of energy in a small amount of space. Batteries not designed for a specific use can be dangerous. Like any product, a small number of batteries are defective and can overheat, catch fire, or explode.

- Purchase and use devices that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- Only use the battery designed for the device.
- Put batteries in the device properly.
- Only use the charging cord that came with the device.
- Do not charge a device under your pillow, on your bed, or on a couch.
- Stop charging the device after it is fully charged.
- \bullet Keep batteries at room temperature. Do not charge them at temperatures below 32°F or above 105°F.

• Store batteries away from anything that can catch fire.

Stop using the battery if you notice odor, change in color, too much heat, change in shape, leaking, or odd noises. If it is safe to do so, move the device away from anything that can catch fire. Call 9-1-1.

- Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash.
- Take them to a battery recycling location.
- Do not put discarded batteries in piles.



Charging e-bicycles and electric vehicles

The safest place to charge e-bikes, e-scooters and electric vehicles is outdoors away from any structure or enclosure and not in direct sunlight. Do not charge a battery when either the charger or the battery is damaged. Do not store batteries in extremely hot or cold locations or in an area that blocks the only exit out of a room. And do not attempt to modify the battery or charger.

Keep debris well away from your home

Every year, wildfires burn across the U.S., with more and more people living in communities where wildfires are a real risk. • Dispose of branches, weeds, leaves, pine needles, and grass clippings to reduce fuel for fire.

• Remove leaves, pine needles, and other flammable material from the roof, gutters,

and on and under the deck to help prevent embers from igniting your home.

• Remove dead vegetation and other flammable materials, especially within the first 5 feet of the home.

• Move construction material, trash, and woodpiles at least 30 feet away from the home and outbuildings.

Clean your clothes dryer

- Make sure the air exhaust vent pipe for your dryer is not restricted and that the outdoor vent flap will open when the dryer is operating.
- Move things that can burn, such as boxes, cleaning supplies and clothing, away from the dryer.
